SEMI-ANNUAL VOTER'S MEETING

The following items were discussed or acted on at the voter's meeting:

- Faith Woepse was received into membership by profession of faith and Corey Krueger was also received into membership pending his transfer or a profession of faith.
- Voters approved Pastor's declaration of a \$9,000.00 housing allowance for 2007.
- Pastor reported that an Adult Information Class with 6 adults who want to become members will start February 1st.
- Building & Grounds reported that the work on the new lighting will start in about two weeks. Schnell Electric will do the work.
- The voters approve a commitment to Synod of \$15,600.00 for the next year.
- The voters reviewed the constitution revisions. The Synod's Constitution Review Committee has copies of Trinity's revised constitution and bylaws and will be meeting at the end of January to review the changes. If all goes well the revised constitution and bylaws can be voted on at the April meeting.
- Starting January 29th the church office will be in the teacherage. The move took place Saturday January 27th. Gary Vetter has acquired a desk, chair, and conference table from the company he works for at no cost to the congregation. He is working on office furniture for the Pastor's office. There will be ongoing improvements and additions to this project this year.
- The Building Expansion Committee received three different proposals from the architect. They are studying the merits of each and will be bring more information to the congregation in the coming months.

WHERE WAS EVERYONE?

The weather on January 23, 2007 was mild, the roads in good winter driving condition, no Packer game, but just 6 council members, the pastor, and 8 members of the congregation attended the voter's meeting. I know the State of the Union Address was that evening and I am assuming that everyone wanted to hear what the President had to say. Just 6 months ago there was an outcry about a vote that was taken without good congregational representation. How soon we forget.

The voter's meetings are always in January, April, July, and October. They are generally the third Tuesday of the month, and normally start at 7:30 p.m. The church council tries to hold to this schedule so members of the congregation can plan for the meetings. This meeting was announced in the newsletter, twice in the bulletin, and at least twice by pastor. Agendas and previous meeting minutes were available in the Narthex for two weekends prior to the meeting. Yet only 8 members felt obligated to attend the meeting.

It is the responsibility of the members of this congregation to keep themselves informed about what is happening in the congregation. The voter's meetings are intended to inform and receive feedback from the members.

We are constantly encouraged to study the Scriptures to make sure that we are not led astray by false teaching. That same principal applies to the business of the congregation. Apathy by the members towards these meetings can allow for one-sided decisions to be made at the meetings.

I remember an impressive comment made by Pastor Otto (when he was serving Trinity as vacancy pastor) at a board meeting at First German. He told those of us at the meeting that attendance at Trinity's voter's meetings exceeded First German's whose congregation was more than 4 times larger than Trinity. This I considered a testimonial to the members of Trinity and their commitment to the Lord's work.

January 23, 2007

The Congregational President, John Smith, called the meeting to order at 7:33 p.m.

Pastor Pope opened the meeting with a devotion from I Corinthians:12.

Roll Call was taken via Attendance List. All voting members in attendance signed the Attendance List. Attendance List is attached.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt the meeting **Agenda** with the addition of approval of the minutes of the Special Voters Meeting on November 12, 2006. Motion carried.

A motion was made and seconded to **Ratify the Memberships** of Faith Woepse and Corey Krueger by Profession of Faith. Motion carried.

The **Minutes** of the October 24, 2006 Quarterly Voters Meeting were approved as presented. Motion carried.

The **Minutes** of the Special Voters Meeting on November 12, 2006 were approved as presented. Motion carried.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Pope gave the Pastor's Report.

- Baptisms: Chase Skinkis, Breanna Hanson and Kaitlyn Isaacson.
- Adults who will be receiving Instructions: Doug Richter, Dennis and Shanna Bratz, Holly Isaacson and Kim Meade (fiancé of Corey Krueger).
- Onlicense.net was selected for our worship service procedure.
- The Worship Committee and Pastor Pope are working together to select popular hymns for our church services.
- A motion was made and seconded to approve the Housing Allowance of \$9,000 for Pastor Pope's residence. Motion carried.

Treasurer's Report: Len Arnold gave the Treasurer's Report.

- In the last 6 months our church expenses exceeded our contribution income by \$4,000.
- A question was asked as to approximately how much money is left for our building expansion project after the remodeling, lighting and organ updates have been paid for. Len Arnold reported that there is approximately \$150,000 in the building expansion fund.
- The balance on hand in the church checking account on December 31, 2006 was \$1,740.18.
- A motion was made and seconded to accept the Treasurer's Report as presented. Motion carried. Copy attached.

Board for Building and Grounds Report: Gary Vetter gave the Board for Building and Grounds Report.

- The frames around the murals have been installed.
- The new locks have been installed.
- The new lighting fixtures will be delivered on January 24, 2007. The electrician will start installing them in approximately 2 weeks.
- Carpet cleaning will be done in the spring of 2007.
- The Board for Building and Grounds Report was adopted as presented.

Board of Education Report: Warren Lutze gave the Board of Education Report.

- Trinity has 15 students attending school at Newtonburg in grades K – 8.
- A total of 34 children participated in Trinity's Christmas program with 8 of them being our elementary students at St. John's.
- Jeff Kasten has agreed to serve as the Lead MLHS Delegate.
- Our congregation will be serving lunch at MLHS on Feb. 13. There is a sign up sheet in the narthex for those who can help serve and/or provide donations.
- Copy of Board of Education Report attached.
- The Board of Education Report was adopted as presented.

Board for Spiritual Affairs Report: In the absence of Al Bonfigt, Pastor Pope gave the Board for Spiritual Affairs Report.

- The Board for Spiritual Affairs is working on dividing the church members between each of the members of the Spiritual Affairs Committee members. Cottage meetings will start in the near future.
- A motion was made and seconded to approve the Synod Commitment at \$15,600. Motion carried.
- The Board for Spiritual Affairs Report was adopted as presented.

Cemetery Committee Report: Harry Bratz and Fred Wehausen gave the Cemetery Committee Report.

- The Constitution and Bylaws of the Cemetery need updating. This will be done.
- The Cemetery Committee Report was adopted as presented.

OLD BUSINESS:

- The Revised Constitution and Bylaws were explained to all voting members in attendance. The Constitution Committee has contacted the Synod and the Synod will have to approve the proposed Constitution and Bylaws before the church's voting members can vote on the new Constitution and Bylaws. It was estimated that voting on the Revised Constitution and Bylaws could be done at the quarterly voters meeting in April, 2007.
- As of Monday, January 29, 2007 the church office will be located in the Teacherage. Gary Vetter was able to obtain donated desks and office equipment for the church office. The council and volunteers will move the new equipment into the Teacherage on Saturday, January 27, 2007.
- The Building Expansion Report was given by Earl Glaeser. The Building Expansion Committee has met with an architect in Green Bay. The committee has received 3 building proposals from the architect and has another meeting scheduled on January 24, 2007.

- There was no new business.

The next quarterly voters meeting will be held in April, 2007.

A motion was made and seconded to adjourn the meeting. Motion carried. The meeting adjourned at 8:56 p.m. and closed with a prayer by Pastor Pope.

Congregation Mission Offerings Increased in 2006

Congregations followed through on their 2006 Congregation Mission Offering commitments and submitted more than the projected amount for the calendar year. The amount, \$20.2 million, was a four percent increase from the \$19.5 million given to the synod last year.

The increase keeps receipts ahead of the U.S. rate of inflation, which is 3.5 percent. In order for WELS to maintain current ministries, however, offerings need to grow by five to six percent each year.

"I cannot find enough ways to say, 'Well done, good and faithful servants,'" said WELS Director of Christian Giving Pastor Dave Liggett. "I'm confident that as we strive to 'excel in the grace of giving' we will see our giving rate remain above the rate of inflation and, with God's help, increase to the point where current ministry can be expanded." Churches are currently submitting their commitments for 2007.

Congregation Mission Offerings is a portion of member offerings committed each year by WELS congregations for synod-level ministries. It is the primary source of synod support, making up 62 percent of total revenue. Other sources include gifts from individuals (8%), foundation grants (24%), and bequests (5%) besides other (1%). All sources fund the 2006-07 fiscal year budget of \$32.7 million. Nearly 75 percent of the WELS budget goes to support missions and ministerial education, while the remainder goes toward such things as parish services, mission advancement, and administration.

Lutheran High School Closing for 2007-08 Academic Year

At the December 2006 board meeting of East Fork Lutheran School, Whiteriver, Ariz., it was decided the high school would close for the 2007-08 school year. Although the elementary school (grades K-8) will remain open, board members felt it would not be wise stewardship for the high school to begin another academic year, given the school's financial situation.

"This transition is going to be tough, but it's not all gloom and doom," says Rich Carver, school principal. For example, an arrangement has been made so students can attend Michigan Lutheran Seminary, Saginaw, Mich., next year. A generous individual is willing to pay tuition for any East Fork students who attend Michigan Lutheran Seminary, leaving them to pay only personal expenses. A support group is also in the works for students choosing to attend nearby public high schools.

"Even though change can be hard and painful, we're trying to look at this the way God would want us to look at it," says Carver. "Instead of focusing on the negative, we're looking at new opportunities and ways of reinventing our ministry. There is some good that's coming out of this."

WELS Hires Communication Director

In an effort to fully coordinate communications and provide messages effectively and efficiently to various constituents, WELS has hired Joel Hochmuth to be its full-time director of communications.

In this position, Hochmuth will be responsible for strategic planning, communication coordination, WELS publications, marketing efforts, and public relations for WELS.

"We have the rock-solid truth, but keeping it to ourselves doesn't do anybody any good . . .," says Hochmuth. "Our ultimate mission is to communicate the gospel."

A member at Beautiful Savior, Marietta, Ga., Hochmuth worked for 15 years at Cable News Network (CNN) in Atlanta, Ga., where he produced hundreds of network-quality, long-form video reports and series. He also taught communication courses at Kennesaw State University, Kennesaw, Ga.

New President at Martin Luther College

- Martin Luther College is honored to announce that Rev. Mark Zarling, professor at Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary, has accepted the call issued to him by the MLC Governing Board to serve our Savior Jesus Christ at MLC as its next president. President elect Zarling replaces current President Ted Olsen who will retire July 1, 2007. We join Pastor Zarling in prayer as he requested "...that Jesus continue to light up the campus of MLC with his illuminating Gospel, keeping souls in the saving faith and training servants to live that faith."

Enrollments

- Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary, Mequon, WI: 173. On-campus = 126 (seniors: 35; middlers: 41; juniors: 48; PSI: 2); Off-campus = 47 (vicars: 41; emergency service: 2; leave of absence: 4).
- As the second semester begins, Martin Luther College, New Ulm, MN, provides on-campus instruction to 713 students (531 – Education, 175 – Pre-seminary, 7 – Unclassified.) We also provide instruction to students in other undergraduate preparations, in professional growth, in pre-college courses, and in graduate studies, serving a total of 802 students. In addition to this, MLC serves 200-300 called workers in workshops each year.
- Michigan Lutheran Seminary, Saginaw, MI: 236 – 111 boys and 125 girls. (By class: seniors: 59; juniors: 63; sophomores: 54; freshmen: 60.). MLS had more mid-year applications this year than at any other time in school history.
- Luther Preparatory School, Watertown, WI: 379. LPS welcomed seven new transfer students at the start of the semester. The student body is comprised of 204 boys and 175 girls. The senior class remains the largest at 117, with the junior class being the smallest with 80.

Midyear Graduation and Assignments

- On December 14, Martin Luther College held its midyear graduation. Of the 17 graduates, five were available for midyear assignments. In addition, three previous graduates made themselves available for assignment. Six new and previous graduates received assignments for temporary and permanent calls. In addition, one previous, temporary assignment was made permanent. See the MLC website for details.

Involvement in Evangelism Outreach & Cross-Cultural Ministry Training

- Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary will host its annual Mission and Ministry Feb 6-8. Other activities include: 63 students participated in evangelism outings during 1st semester involving English and Spanish speaking opportunities in Milwaukee and Chicago; 6 students studied in Mexico and 12 students did outreach work in Asheville, NC over Winterim; and 8 students will do outreach work in Ottawa, Canada, over spring break.
- At Martin Luther College:
 - o **Urban Ministry Focus:** Our Urban Ministry Focus includes specific coursework, convocations and seminars, early field experiences, and student teaching in urban areas. Many students have participated in the experiences, and an increasing number of candidates receive calls to WELS urban schools each year.
 - o **Evangelism Day:** Dozens of teachers, pastors, and missionaries from all over the world helped our students reflect on evangelism from every angle at our second annual Evangelism Day January 17. From "Small Talk and Listening Skills" to "Various Witness Methods" to "Welcoming People to Our Churches and Schools," our students concentrated on witnessing, both in their personal lives and in the public ministry for which they are training.
 - o **Daylight:** Over 80 students will canvass and witness for WELS mission churches this spring as part of *Daylight*, a program that offers students a chance to serve the church

while gaining valuable ministry experience. Over 1100 students have participated in *Daylight* service/ministry projects in the last six years.

o

Serving the Chinese Community: Three nights each week MLC sophomore Alexandra Chworowsky instructs 20 MLC students in Mandarin. The group is excited about upcoming field trips to congregations who are active in ministry to the Chinese. Currently, Friends of China operates in five Chinese cities, and 23 of their 28 teachers are MLC graduates.

At the two prep schools: Project Titus teams (MLS) have been chosen for the summer of 2007. We are working extensively with WELS Kingdom Workers this year for an emphasis on North American Outreach. Planning for Project Timothy 2007 (LPS) is underway. Each year these two projects send more than 100 students and chaperons to various mission settings around the world.

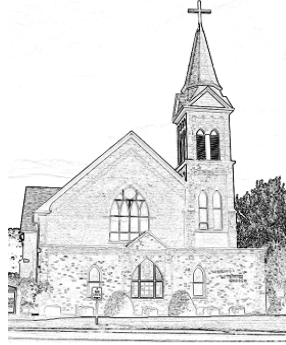
Curriculum and Classroom:

- The annual inter-semester Winterim session was held at Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary January 8-19. All on-campus students enrolled as did 6 students from Cristo Palabra de Vida (our WELS Hispanic Outreach arm), 6 pastors and 7 guest presenters.
- Summer Quarter 2007 at WLS is June 18-July 6. Course and registration information was sent to all called workers in the fall.
- MLC is pursuing a four-year ECE program for students interested in this growing ministry; students currently in the program study for five years, earning a double major in both elementary ed and early childhood ed. To encourage ECE teachers in the field, MLC is offering a \$1000 incentive grant to 25 teachers who complete a three-course program. (*Check www.mlc-wels.edu/go/ecegrant for more information.*)

- At MLS: Summer camp opportunities in June and July 2007 are for all ages. Plans are in the works for more than a dozen offerings, covering sports, music, art, foreign languages, Bible study and evangelism training. Watch the website (www.mlsem.org) for more details.

Advancing the Mission of our Schools

- Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary formed a committee to organize a WLS alumni society. The election of the initial WLS Alumni Executive Committee will take place by Zoomerang poll over the internet before the 2007 Lenten season begins.
- LPS has named Steven Strucely of Dallas, Texas, as its first Director of Mission Advancement. Steven and his wife Kathy have two sons at LPS; they will move to Watertown in February. Previously Steve has worked for 25 years with the American Heart Association in a variety of capacities. LPS has produced a ten-minute DVD which outlines the purpose of LPS. The DVD can be used in a variety of settings and is geared for adults, teens, and upper grade school students. - We continue to be amazed and grateful for the outpouring of gifts and support for our ministerial schools and our ministerial education system. Gifts come from congregations, conferences, schools, and individuals. Sometimes they are designated for student assistance, for the WELS Education Endowment Fund or for ongoing operations. Each one of them is deeply appreciated and is put to use for the purpose for which it is designated. It is not an overstatement to say that without this continued flow of gifts it would not be possible to maintain our mission: to provide the number of called workers our synod desires with the qualities our synod expects.

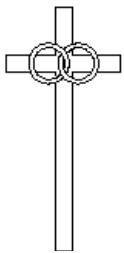

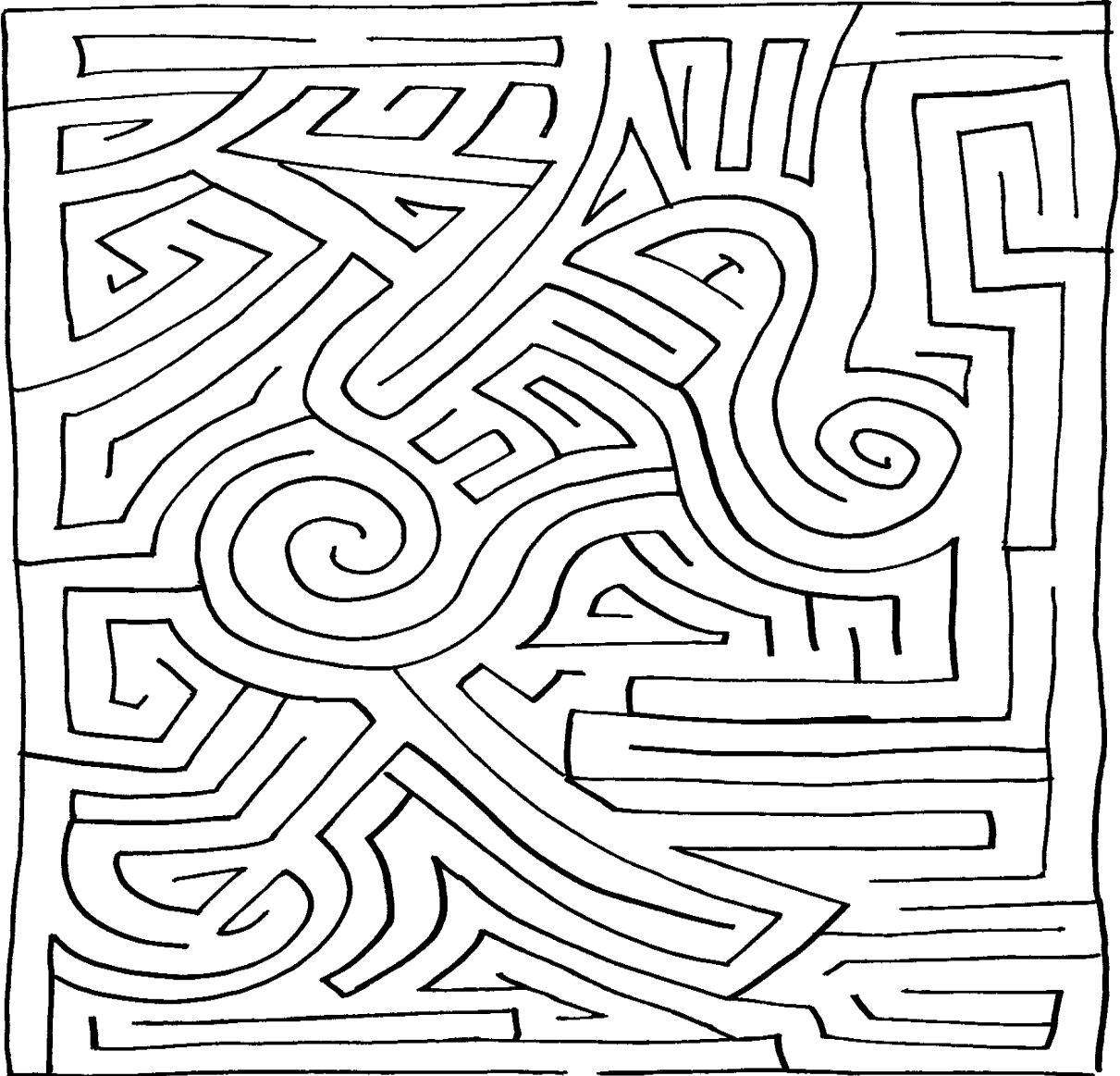
