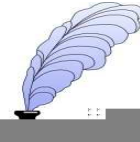

JANUARY SEMI-ANNUAL VOTER'S MEETING



The semi-annual voter's meeting will be January 22, 2008 at 7:30 p.m. in the church basement. The agenda has not been set. There will be more information on the expansion project presented at the meeting. We will also need to elect someone to fill the open position on the Board for Education. The informational meetings will again be held on January 19th and 20th after the church services. Installation of the newly elected Board and Council members will be January 6th.

ENVELOPE DESIGNATIONS

There might be some confusion about the different giving boxes on the weekly envelopes. I am going to try to explain the differences.

- GENERAL – The amount you specify in this box will go against the general operations of our congregation. This would cover salaries, utility bills, St. John's tuition, and the normal operating expenses. The general fund also covers the difference between what is given specifically to Synod and MLHS and the annual commitment that the voters approve at the Annual Meeting.
- WELS – The amount you specify in this box will go directly to our Synod. None of these monies are used within our congregation. If the monies contributed to WELS falls short of our annual commitment the shortfall comes out of the general fund. If the monies contributed to WELS exceeds the annual commitment all those monies go to the Synod.
- BUILDING – The amount you specify in this box goes to the Board for Buildings and Grounds budget to be used for the general maintenance and up keep of our facilities. These monies do not go to the Building Expansion project we are planning. There seems to be some confusion here because we have seen a substantial increase in giving to this category.
- OTHER - You must specify where you want the monies to go that you put in this box. Simply write a notation above the box for things like the radio broadcast or a weekly offering to MLHS. This is also the box to use to give for our building project. Just note Building Expansion and those monies will be designated to that fund.

The financial secretary and treasurer will make sure that your monies get to the right account. The leadership at Trinity strives to keep the records correct. Please help us to do your wishes.

News from the WELS

Communicating our identity as a synod

From the office of President Mark Schroeder

All too often we don't fully appreciate "everyday" blessings. When blessings are routine, we may not think about them much at all. We may not recognize them for the blessings they really are. We may lag in our thanks to God for those many good things that he does for us even without our asking.

I believe that's true about the blessings that God gives us through this extended spiritual family that we call the Wisconsin Synod. We may not consciously think of how God blesses us in our synod. We may tend to focus on what's wrong instead of rejoicing in what's right. We sometimes allow those outside of our synod to define us and characterize us. We may become apologetic, defensive, maybe even sometimes a little embarrassed when it comes to our synod and what it represents. And failing to appreciate what God graciously does for us, we miss opportunities to fully benefit from those blessings and to invite others to be part of this synod in which those blessings come to us.

Over the next year, it seems good for us to remember and to emphasize some of those blessings; to remind ourselves of what this synod stands for, what it does, and why we are a part of it. You've already seen a few hints of those reminders in the "Together" newsletter and in WELS Connection. In the January issue of Forward in Christ (p. 32), you'll see the first in a series of columns summarizing those blessings, focusing on our identity: Who are we? Where does WELS stand? What is our synod for, as opposed to what we are against?

You will also see efforts to sharpen and define our synod's identity as we work to improve the look and content of all WELS communications. Already we've begun to plan for the redesign our synod's Web site, aiming to make it more usable for our members and more effective in communicating who we are to the outside world.

Highlighting the blessings of our synod will not be an exercise in boasting or an attempt to paint an unrealistically positive picture of ourselves. Rather, in reviewing our blessings, we will humbly appreciate them more for ourselves, we will unite around our common mission, and we will be more likely to want others to share in those blessings with us.

Not another one!

At this time of year, your mailboxes are filled with two things: Christmas cards—and appeals for donations. If you are like me, you look forward to the first; you can easily be annoyed by the second.

We are well aware that you receive numerous funding appeals from many different organizations, including your synod and its ministerial education schools. Please note that the Conference of Presidents will be taking a comprehensive look at the number and type of funding appeals being sent out from the synod and its various areas of ministry. (The synod doesn't control the appeals sent out by WELS-affiliated organizations that are not a part of the synod structure.) The issue is a somewhat complicated one, and the COP will be doing all it can to address the situation.

In the meantime, please be patient. Please continue to exercise your God-given judgment as to which of these requests for support fit in with your faith-filled stewardship of God's blessings.

Military chaplain lands in the Middle East

Rev. Paul Ziemer, national civilian chaplain to the military and Armed Forces liaison, arrived in Kuwait on Dec. 13 to begin ministering to troops stationed overseas. From there, he will be traveling to U. S. military installations in the Middle East as he gains clearance from the military.

Rev. Carl Ziemer, administrator for WELS Special Ministries, estimates that his brother Paul will remain in the Middle East for 10-14 days. "It depends on how many opportunities he has to travel to the troops," says Carl Ziemer. "While he has some arrangements already made, the situation there is fluid and demands a great deal of flexibility."

Paul Ziemer is able to contact and minister to troops through referrals received by WELS Military Services. Although Military Services has only received the contact information of approximately 90 WELS soldiers in this region, "We are confident that there are many more WELS people in the Middle East," says Carl Ziemer. "We hope some identify themselves once our chaplain is in the area." Paul Ziemer will be working with as many of these referrals as possible, and other military personnel as he has opportunity.

Although these visits to the Middle East only occur once or twice a year because of inadequate funding and difficulties in gaining access to the troops, Carl Ziemer says they are very important. "Especially in times of great stress and danger, Christians need to hear about God's faithful love and care. They need to know that the extended family of believers supports them and is praying for them."

While in the Middle East, Paul Ziemer will also continue to build relationships with key military contacts. "These relationships are extremely important for future trips to the Middle East and elsewhere," says Carl Ziemer. "If we are serious about wanting to serve WELS members in areas of hostility, then we must engage and win the respect and cooperation of military leaders and chaplains."

Koelpin travels to Hong Kong

Rev. Dan Koelpin, administrator for WELS Board for World Missions, returned on Nov. 28 from Hong Kong, where he met with leaders of Asia Lutheran Seminary to discuss the strategy and needs of the institution and to determine how WELS can best support its operation.

"We're trying to establish a distinctive Lutheran seminary in a world-class city," says Koelpin. But he says the challenge is finding resources to support it. "We've got the plan, we've got the people, and we've got the potential; but we don't have the money to implement the plan fully."

Koelpin and Dr. John Lawrenz, president of Asia Lutheran Seminary, talked about the lack of Christian materials currently available in the Chinese language, and the need for a full-time translation specialist at the seminary. They also discussed property options and the seminary's technology needs for the future.

"Supporting Asia Lutheran Seminary and outreach to the Chinese-speaking world is the foremost priority of the Board for World Missions," says Koelpin. "And we're going to have to try to funnel some resources there. This is the kind of effort we can't do halfway. We need to go in with both feet or not at all."

Koelpin will relay these findings to WELS Southeast Asia Committee in January and at the Board for World Missions meeting in February. "There's no doubt in my mind that the board will want to back Hong Kong, but it's all in the Lord's hands," says Koelpin, "If we operate with the funds we have, we can only give them limited help. So we really need a huge influx of funds. There's never going to be a time for reaching out in [this region] like there is right now."

New ministry positions authorized

The Executive Committee of the Board for Home Missions (BHM) authorized five new pastor positions, two staff ministers, two preschool directors, and one other assistant at its meeting Dec. 13-14.

The new pastoral positions are at Trinity, St. Lucia, West Indies; Bethlehem, Lakeville, Minn.; Beautiful Savior, Clarksville, Tenn.; and new congregations in Reno, Nev., and Battlement Mesa-Parachute, Colo.

The new congregations are being established by BHM in partnership with existing WELS congregations in those areas.

The two staff minister positions are at Abiding Love, Loveland, Colo., and Saving Grace, Mobile, Ala. The two preschool director positions are at Christ the King, Palm Coast, Fla., and Grace, Spring Hill, Fla. BHM is providing short-term funding for these four positions to help congregations initiate the programs.

BHM is also providing funds that will allow a Sudanese immigrant assisting with a Sudanese outreach program at Lincoln Heights, Des Moines, Iowa, to work full time.

The new positions bring the total number of ministry positions authorized for 2007 to 19. All of the positions are funded within BHM's current budget; no additional dollars are required.

MLC mid-year graduation service

Fourteen students from Martin Luther College (MLC), New Ulm, Minn., will graduate on Dec. 19. Ten students are graduating with a degree in elementary education, and the other four in elementary-secondary education.

Four of the students are available for assignment anywhere. The other 10 are either declining assignment, deferring assignment to a later date, or are unavailable for assignment because of personal reasons, such as marriage plans.

It is unknown when the students available for assignment will be assigned. "We don't control what calls are available or how the candidates fit the needs of individual churches or congregations," says Prof. William Pekrul, public relations director at MLC. "At MLC our commission is to train men and women for service to our Lord. It is up to the Lord where they will serve him."

Also at the graduation service, 26 men and women will be recognized for completing the proper course work for synod certification, which qualifies them to teach in WELS schools.

Rev. Mark Zarling, president of Martin Luther College, says, "I pray that the Lord Jesus, who has given these gifts to the church, make them gifts to many other souls as they clearly teach others that Jesus is the gift of life eternal."

The service will take place at 9:30 a.m. in the MLC gymnasium. Pres. Zarling will preside at the service and Prof. David Sellnow will preach.

Budget on track for surplus

The latest financial figures show the synod's operating budget continues to be on track for a \$1 million surplus for the fiscal year. Any surplus will be used to re-create a buffer fund to be used for future unanticipated support shortfalls.

One key factor is that Congregation Mission Offerings, the offerings congregations give for the collective work of synod—known as CMO—continue their positive trend. November's CMO was up 2.5 percent over the same month last year—the fifth straight monthly comparative increase. From July through November, CMO was \$1.1 million greater than the prior year and forecast to be \$500,000 greater than the budget.

Todd Poppe, WELS chief financial officer, cautions that the forecast surplus is heavily dependent on CMO for calendar year 2008 and that those subscriptions won't be known until the end of January 2008 or later.

Parish Assistance expands special services

Dr. Ronald Heins, the former director of WELS' consulting service, Parish Assistance (PA), has agreed to serve the ministry on a part-time basis by providing a variety of special services to congregations, such as serving pastors as a mentor or coach, assisting with team building, or involving more members in ministry.

Heins' service will allow expansion of PA's special services to complement their core ministry, which is to provide a fee-based, comprehensive, four-phase consulting service to congregations that typically lasts about three years.

The Board for Parish Services on Dec. 3 extended a call to Rev. Bruce Janisch to serve as a full-time WELS Parish Assistance consultant. Janisch, who is currently serving Ascension in Plymouth, Minn., would join Rev. Elton Stroh and Mr. Greg Schmill as the ministry's third full-time consultant and would concentrate on the Parish Assistance core consulting service.

Neither the work Heins will be doing, nor the call for a third full-time consultant requires new budget dollars.

The Bible-The First Five Books

This month's part of the Bible focus' is on Hebrew poetry.

INTRODUCTION

We have now come to the third section of books of the Old Testament. The books of this section are called the Books of Poetry or the Poetical Books. When we think of modern poetry, we probably think of something written in measured lines, with rhythm, often in colorful language, and probably with rhyme. An example of the kind of poetry that we are used to hearing would be these famous lines:

**"Poems are made by fools like me,
But only God can make a tree."**

Though colorful language may be absent from these particular lines, they definitely do have rhythm and rhyme, and they are measure lines. We should not expect Biblical Hebrew poetry to be exactly like the poetry we are used to today. There is almost no rhyme to Hebrew Poetry. The lines are not always exactly measured, and sometimes a definite rhythm is difficult to find. But there are a number of features that make Hebrew poetry a poetry of the highest level and that make it very enjoyable to read and hear.

PARALLELISM

The main feature of Hebrew poetry is called PARALLELISM. Parallelism means a repetition or echoing of a thought

Read this verse from [Psalm 83:1](#) and notice how the same thought is repeated or echoed:

**"Oh God, do not keep silent;
be not quiet, O God, be not still."**

There is really only one thought expressed in that verse; but is expressed three times with slightly different words. That is what we mean by PARALLELISM of expression. When we read the Poetical Books of the Old Testament we can notice three main kinds of parallelism. First is **SYNONYMOUS PARALLELISM**. In this kind of parallelism the same thought is repeated in almost the same words. (Remember that a synonym is a word that means the same as another word.) A good example of synonymous parallelism can be found in [Psalm 49:1](#):

**"Hear this, all you peoples;
Listen, all who live in this world."**

Does the first line say anything different from the second line? No, it simply repeats the same thought in different words. To repeat the thought makes the thought very strong and clear and at the same time makes the expression poetically beautiful. Second is **ANTITHETICAL PARALLELISM**. In this kind of parallelism something is contrasted with another. (Something that is antithetical is something that stands in contrast or is the opposite of something else.) [Proverbs 15:1](#) is an example of antithetical parallelism:

**"A gentle answer turns away wrath,
but a harsh word stirs up anger."**

A "gentle answer" stands in contrast to a "harsh word," and "turns away wrath" stands in contrast to "stirs up anger." The final form of parallelism is **SYNTHETIC PARALLELISM**. In this kind of parallelism the second part adds to or completes the thought from the first part. Note this example from [Proverbs 4:23](#):

**"Above all else, guard your heart,
for it is the wellspring of life."**

You can see that the second line adds on to the thought of the first line.

ACROSTIC CONSTRUCTION

Another feature of Hebrew poetry is called **ACROSTICISM** or **ACROSTIC CONSTRUCTION**. In this type of poetry the letters of the alphabet play a special part. In Old Testament acrostic poetry each line or each stanza begins with a succeeding letter of the Hebrew alphabet. That is, line one would start with the letter "A", line two with the letter "B", and so on through the alphabet. A number of the Psalms and sections from Proverbs and Lamentations are written with Acrostic Construction in the original Hebrew. Because it would be very difficult to do properly, translations generally have not tried to keep the acrostic arrangement found in the original Hebrew. [Psalm 119](#) is a special acrostic poem. Look at the footnote in your NIV Bible to see how the Psalm arranged acrostically in Hebrew. Some other acrostic psalms are Psalms; 25, 34, 37, 111, 112, and 145.

OLD TESTAMENT POETRY AND INSPIRATION

We know that ALL of the Scriptures are inspired by the Holy Spirit. That includes also the Books of Poetry. Why did the Spirit write part of his Word in poetical form? We can guess that one reason was that he wanted his Word to be as beautiful and appealing to us as possible so that we would want to read it frequently. Hebrew poetry with its parallelisms is indeed beautiful and appealing. We can also guess that the Spirit wanted his Word to be easy for us to memorize so that we may constantly carry it with us. It is usually easier to memorize poetry than prose. That is certainly true of Old Testament poetry also. For the Jews, the acrostic constructions also served as a great memory aid since they would know with which letter each line was to begin.

POETRY IN OTHER OLD TESTAMENT BOOKS

Hebrew poetry is not limited to the five books you have listed above. Do you remember where we have already observed examples of poetry in previous books of the Bible? How about the song of Moses in [\[Exodus 15:1-18\]](#) or David's lament for Saul and Jonathan in [\[2 Samuel 1:17-27\]](#). Other sections are also written in poetry such as [\[Genesis 4:23-24\]](#) or Judges 5.

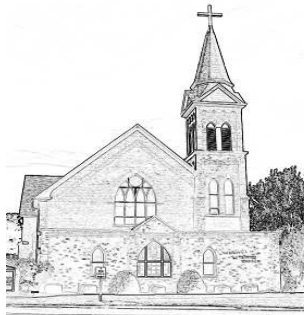

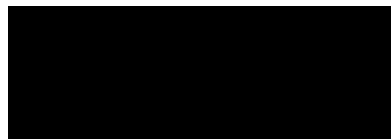
