”Survival Guide 2009”

By now, you’ve likely noticed a barrage of articles on getting through these tough times. Why have another article on jobs and the economy? Well, it might be refreshing to hear one from a Christian perspective. The secular articles that I’ve read offer plenty of good advice, but it never hurts to add God’s Word to a subject, especially one so relevant as our current up and down economy.

What do you do if you’ve been laid off, if such rumors are swirling about your workplace, if you’re hurting in another such way? Well, the first obvious, but easy to forget thing to do is – pray. Scripture encourages us to pray, and repent at the same time. **“Humble yourselves, therefore, under God’s mighty hand, that he may lift you up in due time. (I Peter 5:6).**

Treat this painful downturn as loving discipline from our heavenly Father. When a job is threatened or wealth is lost, we are reminded that God has given us the job and the wealth in the first place. By Word and Sacrament, the Holy Spirit is working through this mess to build in our hearts the humble attitude of Job. **“The LORD gave and the LORD has taken away; may the name of the LORD be praised” (Job 1:21).**

APRIL VOTERS' MEETING SYNOPSIS

The following items were acted on by the voters:

A peaceful release from membership was granted to Marie and Stacy Faber upon their request. Todd Bergmann was received into membership by profession of faith. Approval of continuing Shepherd Staff support for another year. The cost is \$425.00. Shepherd Staff is the software Trinity uses for financial and membership reports. The Board for Evangelism is ready to start canvassing the area around Trinity and will be calling members to become part of this important work. The council will have this prepared for the annual meeting in July.

The delegate for the Synodical Conference in July asks that members who had any opinions or thoughts on the Synod programs and projects to contact him so he has direction. Len Arnold is the delegate going for the district.

WHAT'S HAPPENIN'

The Narthex has gotten empty but nothing has happened from there. There are several reasons that you have not seen any action.

At the bid opening, numerous subcontractor bids were higher than anticipated. Quasius is rebidding those items that they felt were out of line. They are also working with the architect to use different systems that would be less expensive but achieve the same results.

We have not signed the contract. The contract was missing one important addendum, the Maximum Cost Estimate. This the project cost that is not to be exceeded by the contractor as long as we don't make changes. Quasius could not provide that document because they are still negotiating lower costs in some areas. Some of these items have been resolved as of 4/29/09 the rest will be finalized by 5/7/09 at which time we will sign the contract.

These delays will not cost us time in starting because the contractor can have the excavator here the following day. Nobody has a backlog of work so these delays do not cause extra delays as the project progresses.

You will start to see fencing and site preparation start but no demolition until after the wedding on May 8th.

Please start parking as you have been asked to. Keep the lot and roadway to the east of church for those who have difficulty walking. For those who are blessed with good health please park between church and the Trinity Family Center.

News from the WELS **SC adopts budget proposal**

A special message from President Mark Schroeder

The Synodical Council (SC) met last Friday and Saturday to adopt a proposed budget that will be recommended to the synod convention in July.

The WELS constitution requires the SC to submit a budget proposal that is balanced and in line with the anticipated financial support from all sources. A budget that would call for spending greater than anticipated support is not an option. The projected support for the next two years made it necessary for the SC to reduce the synod's ministry program by more than \$8 million (from \$38.4 million to just under \$30 million). As it considered this situation, the SC was very much aware of the painful and difficult choices confronting us. It was clear that significant budgetary reductions in all areas of ministry will be necessary. Recognizing that, the SC made every effort to find ways to limit the size and scope of the reductions that will need to be made.

Some of these reductions will involve the loss of called and hired positions in our mission fields, at our schools, and at the Synod Administration Building. Since the boards and groups that oversee these ministries will be responsible for communicating with the called workers, congregations, and mission fields that will potentially be affected, the budget information in this communication is in summary form only; details will be released in the coming weeks. This will give those responsible the time to speak personally to those that will be affected. Complete financial information will be included in the *Book of Reports and Memorials* and will also be posted online.

Some of the features of the proposed budget include:

A salary freeze for all synodical workers in the first year of the biennium and a one percent increase on the base salary in the second year.

A re-amortization of the synod's debt (projected by the end of June to be reduced from \$22.4 million to \$15 million by Year of Jubilee offerings and by budgetary payments toward the debt). Re-amortizing in this way will reduce annual debt payments from \$2.7 million per year to \$1.6 million per year, making \$1.1 million per year immediately available for the support of gospel ministry. The re-amortization payments would begin in the second year of the biennium (2010-11).

Increasing the portion of health care costs paid by workers by changing the plan deductible from \$500 to \$1,000, resulting in an annual savings of approximately \$400,000.

As the budget was constructed, the SC was keenly aware that there are clear differences of opinion in the synod as to which ministry programs should be given priority. As it weighed the many different scenarios, the SC decided to present a budget that offers two options or alternatives. This approach reflects the SC's recognition of the priority preferences expressed by recent conventions, as well as the current economic conditions and other factors which may have changed since then. The SC is also convinced that presenting two options will help to create an atmosphere in which brotherly discussion and debate will be conducted based on the factual information and a careful consideration of the long-term ramifications of any decision.

There is really only one significant difference between the two proposed options. Both options require significant reductions in all areas of ministry. The difference: in Option A, Ministerial Education receives a synodical subsidy allocation of \$9.1 million; in Option B it receives \$8.1 million. In Option A, World Missions receives \$5.9 million and Home Missions receives \$5.2 million. In Option B, each mission area is allocated an additional \$500,000 in subsidy.

This chart is a comparison of synodical subsidy allocations under the two options. Please note that these figures represent synodical subsidy only and do not include funding from special funds, gifts, or fees.

**Ministry Support includes the President's Office, Conference of Presidents, district ministries, Synodical Council, special called worker support, Ministry of Christian Giving, Finance, Technology, Human Resources, Communications, and facilities.*

The specific impact of these allocations under both options will be described more fully in the coming days after the areas of ministry have had an opportunity to revisit their plans and priorities.

Regardless of the specific decisions they make, under both options above significant numbers of missionary positions, mission locations, faculty and staff positions at schools, and administrative positions will no longer be able to be funded.

Because of the size and scope of the reductions in ministry programs, steps to reduce ministry will need to be taken immediately. In fact, some have been taken already, as vacant positions have not been filled and various programs have been scaled back. In cases where reductions cannot be made until after the new fiscal year begins in July, transition funding has been included in the 2009-10 budget proposal.

As the picture becomes clearer and as the time approaches for final decisions to be made at the synod convention, we recognize the need for continued faith and trust in God's promises. We will need to maintain our trust that even in these painful and difficult decisions God will graciously work to bless his church. And we will want to conduct our discussion and debate with the prayer that God will use this situation to unify us in our common mission for the good of his kingdom.

WELS members evacuate

As flooding remains a threat in the upper Midwest, Rev. Newt Trimmer of St. Paul's, Valley City, N.D., reports 40 to 50 members, including his own family, have evacuated the community after officials urged residents to stay out of town as they wait for the Sheyenne River to retreat.

Trimmer reports that although the river has been over flood stage for three weeks, the most serious problem is the backed up sewer system, which was damaged by all the heavy machinery brought in to shore up the dikes in the area.

Officials say it may take as long as three to four weeks to repair the sewers; until then residents aren't allowed to flush toilets or run water into drains. Many are spending nights at home but using the plumbing at friends or relatives in the area.

St. Paul's was forced to cancel services Sunday, but Trimmer says plans are to worship again this coming Sunday—with portable toilets on hand.

[WELS Committee on Relief](#) has contributed \$3,000 to the cleanup effort. Among other things, the congregation has used the contribution to purchase portable generators, hoses, shop vacuums, pressure washers, and sewer drain plugs.

The Bible-Book of Psalms

This month's part of the Bible focus' is on the Book of Psalms.

GENERAL FACTS ABOUT THE BOOK OF PSALMS

The Book of Psalms was the Old Testament hymnbook, prayer book, and liturgy book. It was continually used by worshippers at the temple and even as they were going up to the temple to worship. Today also the Psalms are a part of our hymn life, prayer life, and our liturgy. Many of the Psalms are the basis for our hymns; we can use the Psalms as our personal prayers; and part of our liturgy is taken from the Psalms. (Cf. the words that the congregation speaks or sings after the sermon, and [Ps. 51:10-12](#).) The Hebrew name for the Book of Psalms is "Sepher Tehillim," or "The Book of Praises." Our word "Psalm" comes from the Greek and means "a song sung to the accompaniment of a stringed instrument." Within the 150 Psalms in our Bible, there are actually five smaller books of Psalms. The five books are as follows:

1. [Psalms 1-41](#) 2. [Psalms 42-72](#) 3. [Psalms 73-89](#) 4. [Psalms 90-106](#) 5. [Psalms 107-150](#)

Each one of these sections ends with a doxology or statement of praise, such as "Praise be to the Lord, the God of Israel, from everlasting to everlasting. Amen and Amen." All of [Psalm 150](#) is a doxology to close the whole Book of Psalms. An ancient Jewish tradition says that the Psalms are divided into five sections or books in order to correspond to the Five Books of Moses. The idea is that the five books of God through Moses are balanced by man's five-fold response in the Psalms.

SUPERSCRPTIONS OR TITLES OF THE PSALMS

116 of the Psalms have titles or superscriptions at the beginning. (The 34 Psalms that do not have titles are sometimes called "orphan" Psalms.) The titles give us such information as: 1) who the author is, 2) the circumstances when they were written, 3) to whom they were addressed, or 4) musical directions. Some information in the titles we simply do not understand because the Hebrew words are mysterious to us. Look at the titles for [Psalms 3-6](#) to see some information the titles give us. The authorship of over 100 Psalms is given in the titles. David's name is listed in the titles of 73 Psalms; this may mean that he is the actual author of all of those 73 Psalms, or in some cases it may mean that the Psalm was dedicated to him. The titles tell us also that the following men wrote Psalms: Moses (one), Solomon (two), Asaph and the Asaphites (twelve), the Sons of Korah (twelve), Heman (one), and Ethan (one).

THE PSALMS ARE A COLLECTION

It is obvious from the many human authors of the Psalms that they were not written at the same time. They were written over a span of time stretching from Moses until after the Babylonian Captivity. ([Psalm 90](#) was written by Moses; [Psalm 137](#) tells of the Captivity.) That means they were written over a period of about 1,000 years. The Holy Spirit saw to it that each human author was carried along by Him so that each of them wrote God's intended words. Jewish tradition says that it was Ezra the Scribe who finally collected all of the 150 Psalms and gathered them into one book.

VARIOUS KINDS OF PSALMS

There have been many attempts to classify the Psalms according to their various kinds or types. As we read the Psalms, we can notice common themes that run through them. It is those themes that allow us to classify the Psalms into kinds or types. We will list some of the kinds of Psalms that are commonly noted:

HALLELUJAH PSALMS

Praise to the Lord is the main theme in this kind of Psalm. "Hallelujah" is Hebrew for "Praise the Lord." The word is found many times in these psalms. (Psalms 106, 111, 112, 113, 117, 135, 146, 147, 148, 149, 150)

PENITENTIAL PSALMS

These psalms give expression to the sinner's repentance over his sins. Confession and a plea for forgiveness is the theme that runs through these psalms. Ps. 51 is an excellent example of a Penitential Psalm. Be sure to note the title of the Psalm before reading it. (Psalms 6, 32, 38, 51, 102, 130, 143)

DIDACTIC PSALMS

The word "didactic" means "teaching." These psalms seek to teach lessons for godly living. Psalm 1 is an example. (Psalms 1, 5, 7, 15, 50, 73, 94, 101)

IMPRECATORY PSALMS

In this kind of psalms, God is called upon to bring punishment on unbelieving enemies so that evil may be stopped and God may be honored. The word "imprecatory" means a "calling upon." Note Psalm 35 as an example of an Imprecatory Psalm. (Psalms 35, 58, 59, 69, 83, 109, 137)

MESSIANIC PSALMS

Psalms of this kind tell about the coming Messiah. It is the New Testament that tells us that many of the psalms spoke clearly of Jesus, the Messiah. For example, Psalm 22 vividly describes Christ's

suffering as he hung on the cross. It even prophesies his very words from the cross. (Psalms 2, 8, 16, 22, 23, 24, 31, 40, 41, 45, 68, 69, 102, 110, 118)

A BOOK FOR ALL NEEDS

Believers over the centuries have known that the Book of Psalms has divine words that fit virtually every human need. Therefore the Psalms have been among the most read and most loved portions of Scripture. Do you need words for repentance? Turn to a Penitential Psalm. Do you feel the need to praise God for some special blessing? Read a Hallelujah Psalm. Do you have some great fear and need comforting? Cast your plea to God through the Psalms.

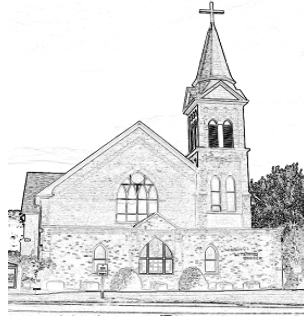

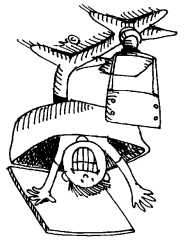

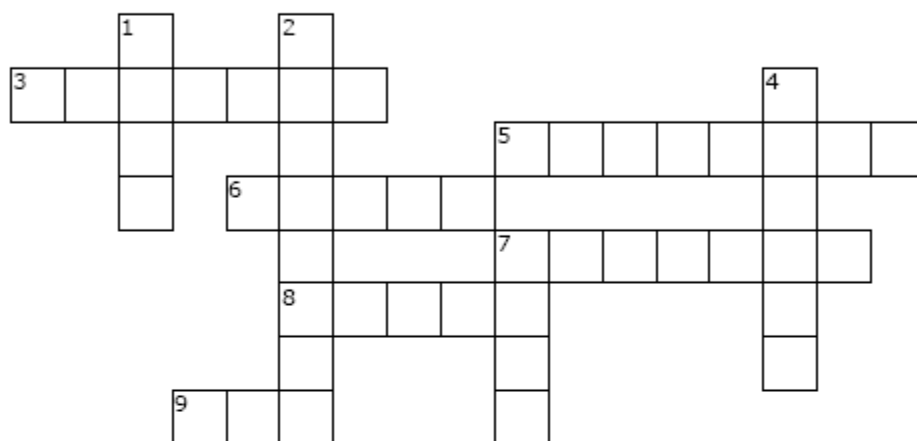
