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Art for the Soul

You may notice something new in upcoming church bulletins. I recently was made aware of a series of three books called *Clip Art* by Steve Erspamer. *Clip Art* is a series of illustrations Erspamer has created for every Sunday of the church year. These illustrations can be used for many things, including church bulletins.

Steve Erspamer is a Roman Catholic artist whose book was published in 1993 by the Archdiocese of Chicago. There definitely are doctrinal differences between us as confessional Lutherans and the Roman Catholic Church. We must not compromise the foundation of our faith, which is holy Scripture alone (2 Timothy 3:15-16). We can't join in fellowship with the Roman Catholic Church because they allow church tradition to stand as an authority alongside holy Scripture. Nevertheless, we hope that many and all Roman Catholics believe the gospel truth that they are saved by faith in Jesus' saving death for them on the cross, not by good works that they have done. More to the point of this article, we share a heritage in our worship styles with Roman Catholics because both of our church bodies arise from the early Christian Church and the styles of worship that developed there over the centuries. For example, we chant the Psalms as do Roman Catholics, not because we have to, but because it is a beneficial ancient worship form. Also, the clip art in Erspamer's book expresses a traditional and time-tested beauty. As the Introduction of the Book explains:

"Many of the images in this book have been drawn in the style of stone carvings in the Romanesque churches that dot the great medieval pilgrimage route through France and Spain. This style, in turn, borrows from Byzantine iconography. As examples of this style, incidental characters often are pictured smaller than main characters; disciples show their allegiance to Jesus by bowing; sometimes a figure will bend and twist to fit a form" (Clip Art for Year B by Steve Erspamer, page v).


In our bulletins over the next few weeks, we'll test out the use of these illustrations, arranging each piece of art with the Scripture reading it illustrates. Use each week will vary based on how well I think the illustration fits the reading. The book also has a CD included. This is an example of how modern computers can be such a great blessing from God – the illustrations are tremendously easy to paste onto the page and then wrap the text around.

I remember teachers in school telling us that some people learn best by hearing, others are hands-on learners, and still others are visual learners, who learn best by seeing. I think all of us are visual learners to some degree. I hope these illustrations help make the events of Jesus' life and the teachings of Scripture even more vivid for our hearts and minds. That we praise the LORD all the more!

News from the WELS

From the office of President Mark Schroeder

The Synodical Council (SC) held its winter meeting on February 24-25. Major items discussed included:

Budget update and future planning

The SC reviewed the ministry financial plan (budget) performance through the end of calendar year 2011. Congregation Mission Offerings (CMO) in 2011 fell short of commitments by \$340,000. Actual gifts were \$460,000 less than 2010. While more congregations submitted CMO commitments for 2012 than the previous year, the commitments are 0.2 percent less than the actual receipts for 2011; planning had anticipated a 3 percent increase.

The Financial Stabilization Fund will enable current programs to continue without immediate program changes, but the reduced level of expected financial support will require adjustments to spending in the next fiscal year. The Synodical Council asked President Schroeder to prepare a plan for increasing support or reducing synod expense amounts by \$1.5 million for the next fiscal year beginning in July, 2012. The areas of ministry will also be encouraged to underspend the current budgetary allocations (as they did last year) and to begin to make initial plans for reduced financial support in the next biennium. Program reductions can be avoided if financial support from Congregation Mission Offerings and gifts from individuals increases beyond the current projections. Status of the efforts to relocate the Synod Administration Building

The committee overseeing efforts to resolve the situation that resulted when the sale of the Mayfair property fell through reported on its efforts. Both the Mayfair property and the new property in Pewaukee have been placed on the market with separate brokers. The brokers believe that both properties have significant value, but it may take time before a buyer steps forward with an offer. While the SC is hopeful that the Mayfair property will sell first (enabling the preferred move to Pewaukee), all options are being considered.

New members appointed

Mr. Tom Schermerhorn has accepted the appointment as lay representative from the Northern Wisconsin District, replacing Mr. Ron Hillmann, who moved out of the district. Rev. Earle Treptow, currently serving as a pastor-at-large member of the SC, will replace Rev. Joel Petermann as one of three Conference of Presidents representatives. Rev. Joel Jenswold of Hortonville, Wis., has accepted the appointment to replace Treptow as a pastor-at-large member to the SC.

Due to term limits, the three SC committee chairmen (Mr. Kurt Austad, Mr. Seth Hansen, and Mr. Tom Schlittenhart) will be replaced this summer. SC members elected to replace them as committee chairmen are Rev. Jonathan Schroeder (ministry), Mr. Paul Holzhueter (finance), and Mr. Warren Ehlke (administration).

Let the Children Come

Martin Luther College, New Ulm, Minn., is proceeding with plans to carry out a special appeal for funds to construct an Early Childhood Learning Center. The "Let the Children Come" effort will seek gifts from individuals to provide funding for the construction and ongoing support of the early childhood program.

The plan calls for the center to be constructed on the Luther Manor property already owned by the college. The Synodical Council approved the sale of a portion of the property to a developer who plans to construct a senior living facility. Martin Luther College plans to work closely with the senior living facility to provide MLC students with opportunities for intergenerational ministry.

WELS member's home destroyed in tornado

After dozens of tornadoes ripped through the South and Midwest March 2, there have been no reports of damage to any WELS churches. However, one member, Betty Hintz, of Hope, Louisville, Ky., lost everything.

WELS Christian Aid and Relief is granting Hope \$5,000 to help Betty, who has no insurance, and others in need. Rev. Steve Lange, Hope's pastor, says his 160-member congregation is also doing what it can to help.

Betty lives near Henryville, Ind., 30 miles north of Louisville. Not wanting to ride out the storm in her trailer, she took refuge in a nearby church. The church collapsed, but Betty and others at the church were uninjured. Her home and its contents, however, were destroyed.

"We are extremely grateful for the assistance from Christian Aid and Relief," says Lange. "It's a tremendous help to our member and to other people who have gone through tragedies like this. It's nice that you can have someone to turn to for help."

He continues, "There are a lot of people who are still suffering, so please keep them in your prayers."

In Alabama, members from Lamb of God, Madison, are mobilizing to see how they can help in their community after tornadoes—following almost the same path as a devastating tornado in April 2011—passed through the area, damaging homes and a local high school. Mr. Mark Vance, director of operations for WELS Christian Aid and Relief, says the committee is prepared to send the disaster response trailer, located in Mobile, Ala., to help in relief efforts.

MLC updates mission statement

At its February meeting, the governing board of Martin Luther College (MLC), New Ulm, Minn., adopted an updated mission statement for MLC that more fully depicts the programs that the school currently offers and plans to offer in the future.

The mission of MLC is "to train a corps of Christian witnesses who are qualified to meet the ministry needs of the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod." The updated mission statement includes wording that further explains MLC's involvement in providing continuing education for called workers, in helping prepare laypeople for broader service in congregations, and in partnering with mission fields to train international students for ministry.

"This does not in any way get away from what has been our main thrust—training preseminary students, teachers, early childhood teachers, and staff ministers," says Rev. Lyle Lange, MLC professor and chairman of the task force studying the mission statement. "We won't be neglecting that, but we will be carrying out our mission . . . by offering training for laypeople as congregations increase opportunities for their members to serve in their churches."

MLC already has been educating laypeople who are interested in either full- or part-time service in their congregations through programs such as the Congregational Assistant Program and numerous certification courses. Most recently MLC has partnered with WELS Special Ministries to provide the WELS Chaplain Certification Program. This program offers training for pastors, staff ministers, and laypeople who serve or wish to serve as chaplains.

The governing board encouraged more collaboration at its last meeting by endorsing further educational partnerships between MLC and the various boards of the Congregational Ministry & Support Group. Currently MLC and the Commission on Evangelism are planning a new certification program for laypeople on evangelism, using online courses building on the popular Schools of Outreach. "We're recognizing the ministry needs that are out there, and since MLC is the WELS

College of Ministry it is natural to look to us to prepare people who might be able to engage in part-time calls in their congregations," says Lange.

MLC also is working with the synod administration and others to look at existing courses synodwide, to determine other opportunities that are available, and to examine further ways to collaborate.

The task force has been examining the mission statement and MLC's program opportunities since October 2010. The committee consists of MLC professors Lyle Lange, James Pope, Lawrence Olson, Earl Heidtke, and Thomas Nass. MLC president Mark Zarling and Prof. David Wendler serve as ex officio members.

LWMS convention registration

The Lutheran Women's Missionary Society (LWMS) will be holding its 49th annual convention June 21-24 in Winston-Salem, N.C. This year's theme is "Our God Reigns." Registration is now open, and forms can be printed off the convention Web site, www.lwms2012convention.com.

"The main reason to have the convention," says Lynnette Hupman, convention co-chair, "is to encourage the mission-mindedness of our synod and especially our women."

Hupman continues: "When you come to the convention, you receive that recharging. You're renewed, you're recharged, you're refreshed to go back and continue praying. That's one of the primary purposes of LWMS—we pray for our missionaries, our mission workers, and the wives of our missionaries."

This year's mission speakers include Rev. Gary Lupe, an Apache national pastor; Rev. Stephen Schmidt, a military contact pastor; Rev. Timothy Bourman, pastor at Sure Foundation in New York City; Rev. Andrew Johnston, missionary in the Caribbean; and Rev. Nathan Wagenknecht and his wife Julie, who work with the Latin American Traveling Theological Educators (LATTE).

Six different workshops will be offered for attendees. Topics range from "Living for Jesus in the land of Islam," presented by two sisters who will talk about being a Christian in a Muslim culture, to "We will serve with his love and compassion," presented by Mark Vance, director of operations for Christian Aid and Relief.

To receive the \$70 early bird registration rate, registration must be postmarked by April 2. After April 2, registration will be \$90, and a \$10 late fee will apply to registrations postmarked after May 1.

The Bible-The Book of Colossians

This month's part of the Bible focus is a look at the Book of Colossians.

COLOSSE (or COLOSSAE)

The city of Colosse was located in the province of Asia about 125 miles east of Ephesus. Neighboring cities were Laodicea and Hiefapolis, where Christian churches were also established (4:13). Colosse was best known in ancient times for its special kind of wool which the Colossians dyed purple.

THE COLOSSIAN CHRISTIANS

The church at Colosse was probably established during Paul's third missionary journey at the time of his three-year stay in Ephesus. There is no record that Paul himself visited Colosse or established the church there. But Luke tells us that when Paul was at Ephesus everyone in the province of Asia heard the word of the Lord ([\[Acts 19:10\]](#)). This would include the people of Colosse. A Colossian named Epaphras returned to Colosse, established the church and served as one of its ministers ([\[Col. 1:7\]](#)). Philemon and Archippus also helped to serve the church at Colosse ([\[Phm. 2\]](#) and [Col. 4:17](#)). Onesimus, the slave of Philemon, was also one of the Colossian Christians (4:9). Sometime after Epaphras had preached the Gospel of free grace and established the Colossian church, false teachings were making their way into the church. The false teachers tried to mix their own ideas with pure Christian teaching and wanted to harmonize the two. (This is sometimes called "syncretism." An example of modern "syncretism" is the attempt to combine traditional African superstitious ideas with Christianity and make a common religion of the two.) These seem to be the ideas that the false teachers were trying to mix with the pure Gospel: 1) that the Jewish laws must still be observed; the

teaching of the Judaizers (2:11 & 16); 2) that the human body must be denied basic things and even be treated harshly (2:21-23); this idea is sometimes called "asceticism;" 3) that angels are to be worshipped (2:18). By trying to add these human ideas to the Gospel, the false teachers were really saying that Jesus Christ is not enough for life and salvation. But by seeking to "improve" Christianity, they were actually destroying the Gospel and removing Christ. If the Colossians followed these teachings, they would be taken captive by man-made ideas and would lose Christ and his salvation (2:8).

THE EPISTLE TO THE COLOSSIANS

Paul was in prison when he heard from Epaphras what was happening at the Colossian church (4:3 & 18). This would again be his first imprisonment in Rome, 61-63 A.D. By letter Paul wanted to address the Colossians because of the report he had gotten through Epaphras. First he wanted the Colossians to know that he was deeply thankful to God for the work the Gospel of Christ had done in their hearts (1:3-7). Then he wanted to expose the false teachings and present Christ clearly as the One who has everything they need for life and salvation. Paul evidently sent his letter from Rome to Colosse by the hands of Tychicus and Onesimus (4:7-9). Colossians, Ephesians and Philemon may all have been sent at the same time through the same men. The Colossians were instructed to exchange letters with the church at nearby Laodicea (4:16). "The letter from Laodicea" may be the same as Ephesians.

THEME AND CONTENTS

"CHRIST IS OUR ALL-SUFFICIENT SAVIOR" 1.Nothing needs to be added to Christ and his Gospel. (1-2) Paul shows that Christ is in every way God and that he has fully accomplished our salvation. No human ideas should be added to Christ and his Gospel. Key passages in this section: "In Christ all the fullness of the Deity lives in bodily form." (2:9) "God was pleased to have all his fullness dwell in him, and through him to reconcile to himself all things, whether things on earth or things in heaven, by making peace through his blood, shed on the cross." (1:19-20) "See to it that no one takes you captive through hollow and deceptive philosophy, which depends on human tradition and the basic principles of this world rather than on Christ." (2:8) "Therefore do not let anyone judge you by what you eat or drink, or with regard to a religious festival, a new moon celebration or a Sabbath day. These are a shadow of things that were to come; the reality, however, is found in Christ." (2:16-17) 2.Live for your all-sufficient Savior. (3-4) Paul encourages his readers to live holy lives because of the new life our Savior has given. Some of the key passages: "Set your minds on things above, not on earthly things." (3:2) "Put to death, therefore, whatever belongs to your earthly nature: sexual immorality, impurity, lust, evil desires and greed, which is idolatry." (3:5) "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom, and as you sing psalms, hymns and spiritual songs with gratitude in your hearts to God." (3:16)



Our new Sunday Bible Class begins March 11th. We're doing a synod-produced Bible Class on the book of Romans. Don't worry if you missed the first session. There are ten lessons, so we'll be continuing this study for the next two months. Please join us at 8:15 am, Sundays. To whet your appetite, consider these words from Martin Luther on Romans:

"This epistle is really the chief part of the New Testament, and is truly the purest gospel. It is worthy not only that every Christian should know it word for word, by heart, but also that he should occupy himself with it every day, as the daily bread of the soul. We can never read it or ponder over it too

much; for the more we deal with it, the more precious it becomes and the better it tastes” (Luther’s Works, edition 35).

Our Thursday night Bible class is the 2nd and 4th Thursday of each month. The Thursday class meets at 6:30 pm, and we’re half-way through the study, “How to Interpret the Bible”. Please consider coming to this class also.


